CONCORD STUDENTS CONTINUE TO WIN AP® SCHOLAR AWARDS

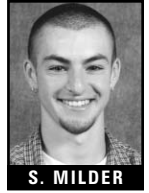
Six students at Concord High School have been named 2002 AP Scholars by the College Board in recognition of their exceptional achievement on the college-level AP Exams. Students take the Exams after completing challenging college-level courses at their high schools. Only about 13 percent of the more than 840,000 students in 13,680 schools who took AP Exams in May 2002 performed at a sufficiently high level to merit such recognition.

Charmaine Milder qualified for the AP Scholar with Honor Award by earning an average grade of

at least 3.5 on all AP Exams taken, and grades of 3 or higher on five or more exams.

BARRIOS AT M.I.T.

Competing with 550 other applicants, **Barry Barrios**, Class of 2003, was selected for the 2002 MITE²S Program at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (M.I.T.). The program, which ran during the summer, provides an introduction to "Engineering, Entrepreneurship and Science for minorities" primarily through a focus on academic work. The curriculum included seven hours of classes and labs each day, along with an average of 5 hours per weekday of homework. (*And that's not counting the 4 hours of homework on the weekends!*)

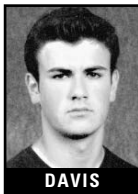
